EXHIBIT A — MOTIVE

Why hide behind a man's name?

Not one reason but three, recurring across two centuries of publishing.

MOTIVE 01

Prejudice

Work signed by a woman was routinely dismissed as trivial "lady's fiction." A man's name meant being judged on the page alone.

MOTIVE 02

Privacy

A pen name kept a wall between public authorship and private life — scandal, politics, and unconventional loves stayed off the title page.

MOTIVE 03

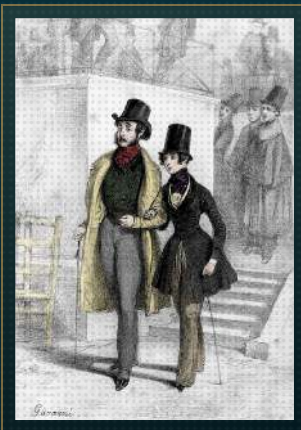
Genre

Realism and science fiction were read as men's territory. Entering as a woman often meant not being let in at all.

Painted in the tailored menswear she wore without the permit France required.

LEAF I — PARIS, 1831

George Sand

HER NAME · AMANTINE AURORE DUPIN

- 70 novels and 50+ volumes more — more celebrated in Britain than Hugo or Balzac.
- Wore men's clothing without the required permit, and smoked in public where no permit could excuse it.
- A Romantic-movement rebel whose books rail against what marriage does to women.
- Advised the provisional government after the 1848 Revolution.

Drawn at the height of her powers, five years into the pen name that let her realism be taken seriously.

Taken near the end of her life, when the whole reading world knew who Eliot was.

LEAF II — WARWICKSHIRE, 1819

George Eliot

HER NAME · MARY ANN EVANS

- Declared war on trivial fiction in "Silly Novels by Lady Novelists" — then wrote serious realism under a man's name.
- Ran the left-wing Westminster Review as editor in all but title.
- Lived openly with philosopher George Henry Lewes — married in everything but law.
- Used the word "pop" for music in an 1862 letter, a century ahead of the charts.



THE BRONTË SISTERS · BRANWELL BRONTË, 1835 · NPG LONDON

Anne, Emily, and Charlotte, painted by their brother — who reportedly erased himself from the gap between them. Eleven years later they would publish as three men.

LEAVES III · IV · V — HAWORTH PARSONAGE

Currer Bell ~~CHARLOTTE BRONTË~~

Ellis Bell ~~EMILY BRONTË~~

Acton Bell ~~ANNE BRONTË~~

- Their joint poetry debut as "the Bells" sold exactly three copies in 1846.
- One year later: Jane Eyre, Wuthering Heights, and Agnes Grey — all published as men.
- Educated largely from their father's library in an isolated Yorkshire parsonage.
- Even "Brontë" was invented — their Irish father remade the family name from Prunty.



PHOTOGRAPH · ALICE BRADLEY SHELDON

The woman science fiction spent a decade assuming was a man — an Air Force major and psychologist writing under a name taken from a jar of marmalade.

LEAF VI — SCIENCE FICTION, 1967

James Tiptree Jr.

HER NAME · ALICE BRADLEY SHELDON

- Army supply officer, then Air Force major, then a stint in the CIA, then a psychology PhD.
- Critics read the prose as unmistakably male — one compared "Tiptree" to Hemingway.
- The 1977 unmasking stunned science fiction and its assumptions about how gender reads on a page.

PORTRAIT · ANDRE NORTON

A Cleveland librarian for eighteen years who wrote science fiction on the side — and became the genre's first woman Grand Master.

LEAF VII — CLEVELAND, 1912

Andre Norton

HER NAME · ALICE MARY NORTON

- Went further than a byline — legally changed her name to Andre in 1934.
- Published 21 novels before she could afford to write full-time in 1958; 130 in all.
- First woman in the Science Fiction & Fantasy Hall of Fame, first female Gandalf and SFWA Grand Master.



PORTRAIT · JOHN SINGER SARGENT

Sargent caught her mid-thought, spectacles and all — a portrait of an intellect rather than a beauty, which is exactly how she wanted to be read.



PHOTOGRAPH · VIOLET PAGET

Dressed à la garçonnie, as she did all her life.

LEAF VIII — FLORENCE

Vernon Lee

HER NAME · VIOLET PAGET

- Master of supernatural fiction and aesthetic theory — and she used the name Vernon Lee in private life too.
- Brought the German idea of *Einfühlung* into English, shaping what we now call "empathy."
- Wrote travel essays about the psychological effect of a place rather than its sights.
- Sidelines for opposing the First World War; recovered by feminist scholars in the 1990s.

EXHIBIT B — VERDICT

The masks came off. The books stayed.

Every disguise on these leaves was eventually lifted — and the work outlived the prejudice that made the disguise necessary.

FINDING 01

It was never about the writing

The same pages praised as masculine genius were written by women. The reception changed; the prose never did.

FINDING 02

The canon corrected itself

Eliot, the Brontës, Sand — taught today under the names they were born with, beside the men they once outsold.

FINDING 03

The question is still open

Initials and neutral bylines still appear on covers today. The calculation these eight women made has not fully retired.

Signed, at last, in her own hand

Eight women. Eight masks. One verdict.

Sand · Eliot · the three Bells · Sheldon · Norton · Paget — the pen was always hers.
